Lesson 5 From Words to Sentences

Subject-Verb sentences

Every sentence has a subject and a verb. 'Subject' is the one who is doing the action like: he, she, we, I, you, it, they, girl, boy, etc and verbs are the action words like: run, sit, stand, look, etc.

When the subject is in singular, then 's' should be added to the verb. When the subject is in plural, then the verb should not change.

Sentence Writing Rules

- A sentence should start with a 'capital letter'.
- Sentence should end with a 'punctuation mark':

Full stop- '.' for a sentence

Question mark- '?' for a question

Exclamation mark- '!' for emotions (surprise or excitement)

- Helping verbs cannot come at the end of the sentence.
- Pronouns and nouns generally come in the begining of the sentence.
